BEST EVER RESULTS...AGAIN!

Lymm High has been celebrating another summer of success with its latest A' Level and GCSE results.

A' Level results days are always full of emotion.

There is a mixture of excitement and apprehension as the envelopes are opened and the eagerly anticipated results are revealed. They also provide a fantastic opportunity to celebrate the hard work of students, and staff, over the previous 2 years and none more so than this year. We are delighted that our Year 13 students who sat their exams this year have done extremely well and have in fact surpassed the record set by last year's co-

hort, to take the mantle of our best ever post-16 results!

Mrs Jennings, our former Head of Sixth Form, said: "I am absolutely delighted. This cohort has been an exceptional group of students, not just in terms of their exam results, but as well-rounded and delightful individuals."

they have achieved. I really am so proud of them."

Once again nearly all Lymm High Sixth Form students have secured places at their preferred universities. This includes very high numbers heading off to the most prestigious institutions, including Oxbridge, and onto the most competitive courses, such as medicine. Our Sixth Form website will soon be updated with our 2024 students' Roll of Honour! Students will also be able to see our Destina-

tions poster in Sixth Form, which shows which institutions our students have gone on to study at.

Mr Williams said: "I'm extremely proud of all of our Year 13 students and the fantastic results they have achieved. Having faced disruption to a significant proportion of their school years due to the pandemic it is remarkable that they have gone on to achieve Lymm High School's best ever post-16 results. It is a fantastic testament to their hard work, determination and resilience."

After our best ever set of A' Level results, it was Year 11's turn to shine the following week.



This year's GCSE results were also the best the school has ever had. Nerves were high following media reports of nationwide results dropping slightly. However, Lymm High students bucked the trend.

In all, 88% of students met the benchmark grades of 9–4 in both English and Maths, with 71% securing grades 9–5 in both subjects and 34% getting grades 9–7 in both. Across all subjects, 45% of grades were at 9–7. Remarkably, over 70% of our students achieved at least one grade 7

(equivalent to the old A grade).

Speaking on Results Day, Mr Williams said: "After last week's phenomenal A' Level results, I could not be prouder of our students and the dedicated staff who have supported them".

This year's very top performers with ten grade 9s were Sophia Cheung and Adam Hunt. This is an incredible performance given how difficult it is to get a 9, and how little margin for error there is in any one subject. We're

thrilled that both students are now in Year 12 and we look forward to following their A' Level journeys.

CYBER STUDENTS

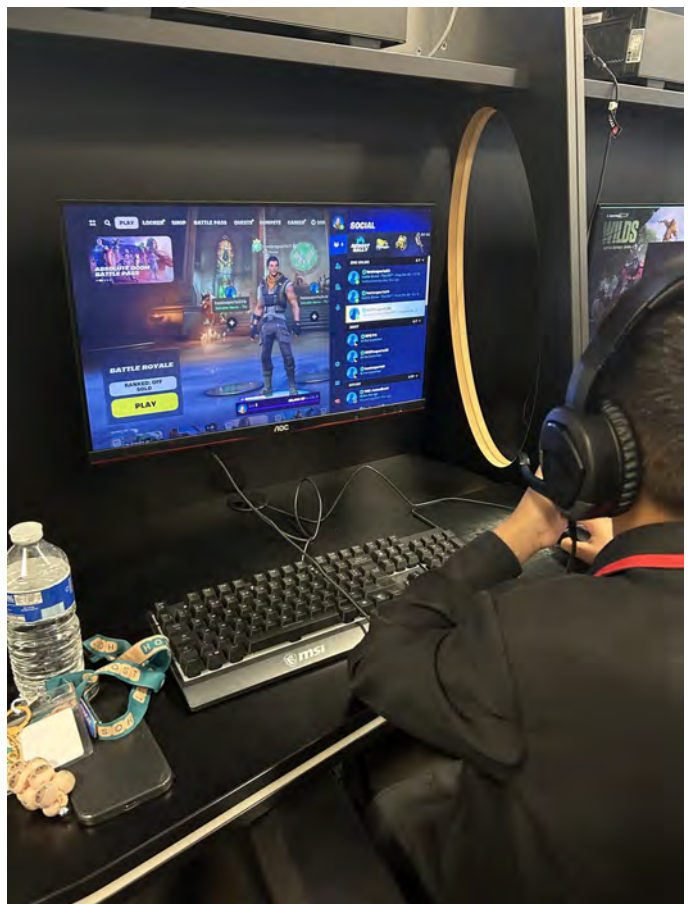
On Tuesday 10th September, Year 9 students had an exciting and educational day at the Cyber First Event at Media City.

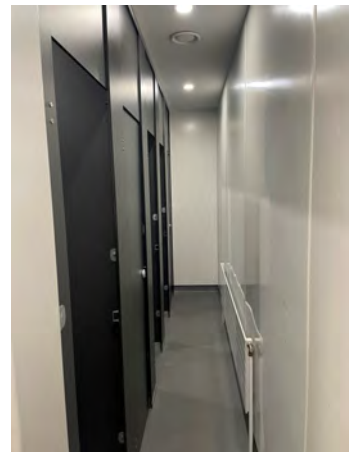




RENOVATING LYMM
