YEAR 12 *Biology* FIELD TRIP

Year 12 biologists enjoyed several sun-filled days in Anglesey completing their required ecology practical, writes Mr O'Flynn.

On arrival, students and staff were greeted by a

heartwarming grand reopening, complete with ribbon cutting and cake! After more than enough cake to last the week, students got stuck into their biology work.

Students and staff enjoyed 3 days of fieldwork under the sun. From going down to the creek on Wednesday to look at species distribution to wandering over the

sand dunes to learn about succession, and exploring the rock pools to understand species diversity on Thursday, there was plenty of work to undertake.

Friday saw my personal highlight of the trip, a visit to RSPB South Stack. Here boasted huge cliffs, a spectacular lighthouse, free ice cream and eight thousand



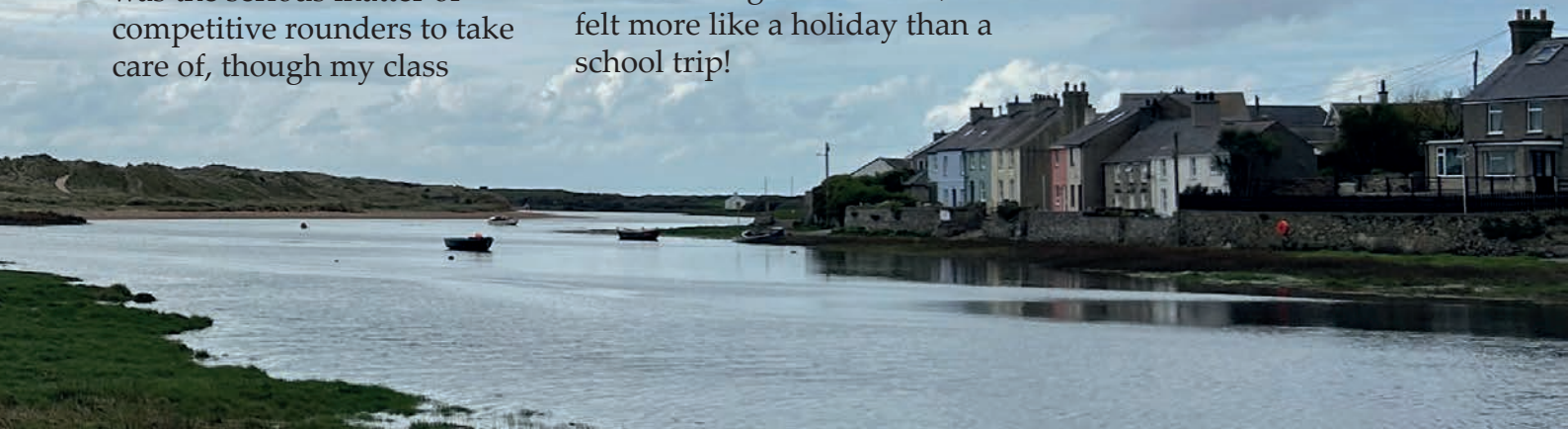


cawing sea birds, including the elusive puffin. Even for the less ornithologically enthused it was quite a spectacle watching thousands of birds take flight to avoid an incoming seal.

It wasn't all sun-soaking and ice cream though, there was the serious matter of competitive rounders to take care of, though my class

batted well, butterfingers and fading light meant we crumbled at the end.

The students couldn't have conducted themselves better and were so good at getting on with things themselves, it felt more like a holiday than a school trip!

The group of 26 students started straight away on their miniature projects. Workshops ran throughout the day with Mrs Taylor and Mrs Collins from the Visual Arts department. Both teachers ran workshops that approached the theme 'Open Air' in different ways, yet they both focussed on the glorious surroundings. Students spent valuable time outdoors, gathering primary research through photography and quick-timed sketches that they developed through their body of work, exploring a wide range of materials and processes.

Miss Simms said, "It was amazing to see how much work students were able to produce over the 3 days at Ty'n-y-Felin. They all came away with an exciting body of work which will support their GCSE coursework projects."

Students and staff had a fantastic time. Particular highlights included exploring the creek at low tide, toasting marshmallows on the campfire, and seeing all of the students' work together in a miniature exhibition at the very end of the trip.

"The trip was a huge success, and students created some really beautiful outcomes", said Miss Simms. "We have documented the trip and their work on our faculty Instagram (@lymmhighartsandtech)."

IET FARADAY CHALLENGE WINNERS

The IET Faraday® Challenge is an annual competition of STEM activity days with a real-world challenge for pupils aged 12–13 years.

Year 8 students Izzy O'Malley, Bella Beardmore, Jessica Wright, Daisy Thomas, Ben Shaw and Ned Martin won their challenge day. They beat two teams from Alderley Edge School for Girls, two teams from Altrincham Boys Grammar School, and a team from Fallibroome Academy.

“The day was great fun and involved having a budget to design and create a tool that could be used for road safety”, said Ned Martin. “We had to come up with the idea ourselves and then plan the project. This involved making a small-scale prototype with an electrical component. We then had to present this to the other schools, and we were scored on our presentation, idea, teamwork and product.”

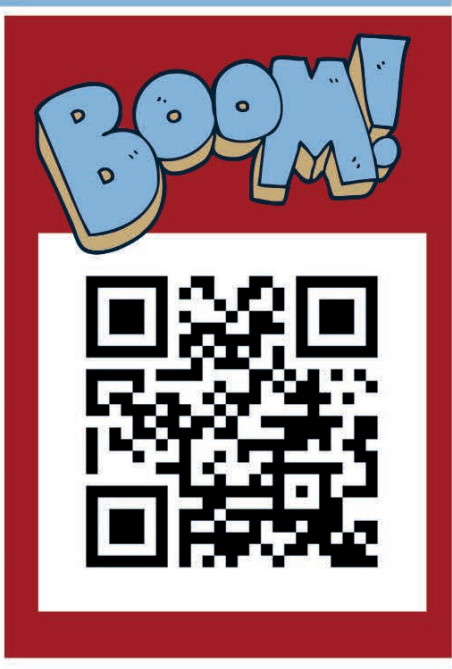
The judges were really impressed with the Lymm High students' teamwork, organisation and presentation skills. “We won the competition as the only comprehensive school at the event”, said Ned. “Our idea was a camera that could be placed on the side of the road and could use AI to detect people distracted whilst driving, such as using phones, drink driving, etc.”

The team assigned roles: team leader, communications director, accountant and design/ engineering, and worked together all day to get the best results. The design consisted of a solar panel with a back-up battery as well as an LED as a camera, and a buzzer to represent a broadcast to emergency services.



“We scored 85/100 points, which got us into the top 20 in England overall (out of more than 100 schools).”

“Unfortunately, we did not come top five, which would have led to us going to Silverstone for the finals. We brought home a trophy and certificate and had a great time. We learnt a lot and did really well”, said Ned.



Cyberfirst

CyberFirst helps young people discover the dynamic industry of cyber security, what a job in cyber can lead to, and helps explore their passion for technology.

In an engaging day designed to immerse Year 9 students in the world of technology, they embarked on a journey through CyberFirst Day at HOST in Salford Media City, writes Mrs Binks.

Upon arrival, they were warmly welcomed and provided with an overview of the day's activities. The itinerary kicked off with an exciting tour of HOST, including exploration of Esports, IOT Avenue and the Immersive Lab, igniting their curiosity about the future of technology. This was followed by a captivating talk on 'The Future of Technology' accompanied by an AI Kahoot Quiz and a lively debate on AI ethics.



The morning continued with hands-on workshops. First, students became digital detectives, delving into data analytics and open-source intelligence through a thrilling GeoGuessr activity. Then, they put their problem-solving skills to the test in 'Crack the Code', competing in teams to unlock devices against the clock with cryptography challenges, delving into the foundations of cybersecurity.

After a well-deserved lunch break, the students indulged in some gaming activities, rounding off a day packed with exploration and learning in the realm of technology.

EXPLORING CRIMINOLOGY AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

A group of Year 9 girls expressing a shared interest in pursuing careers in the Criminology and Criminal Justice sector.

In order to nurture their passion, an immersive project was launched, exposing them to various employers and experiences within the field, writes Miss Hayes.

Under the guidance of esteemed speakers and the dedicated staff of the establishments they visited, the girls delved into a wide range of topics. They explored the reasons behind criminal behaviour and its impact on society. Additionally, they learned about the historical evolution of crime management, spanning from the Georgian era to the present day.

A highlight of the project was a captivating talk by Mark Barrow, the Operational Learning Manager at the National Crime Agency. His insights and expertise provided valuable perspectives on the intricacies of the criminal justice system. Furthermore, the girls had the privilege of engaging in an enlightening session with Dr Anne Marie Day, a Criminology Lecturer from Manchester University.

To gain local knowledge and first-hand experiences, the girls visited establishments in the area. This included trips to the Warrington Police Museum and the Warrington Magistrates Court. They also had the opportunity to explore Shrewsbury Prison, which serves as a tourist attraction. The day was eventful, culminating in the girls working together in teams to tackle an escape room challenge, fostering teamwork and problem-solving skills.

At our school, we strive to create a sense of belonging and support students in realising their full potential. This project aimed to provide the girls with valuable insights into the Criminology and Criminal Justice sector, while also fostering team bonding and preparing them for their future endeavours. With a balance of education and enjoyment, we hope that the girls achieved their overarching goal and found inspiration for their future.

Around 160 students took part in the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) practice expedition on the 10–11th May.

Students were taught new skills such as how to navigate using a map and compass, which will help them in their qualifying expedition in July. "The students showed resilience, teamwork and leadership to get their teams through the practice expedition on a very hot weekend", said Miss Bolland. As an added bonus, the students were lucky enough to witness the Northern Lights.

During Day 1, the group visited Selwicks Bay (Flamborough Head) where they observed the coastal landscape of erosion, including sea stack Adam. They also saw early puffins flying from the headland catching sand eels. Next was a visit to Trinity Lighthouse, followed by physical geography fieldwork at Scarborough North Shore assessing coastal sea defences. In the evening, students enjoyed ice cream at the Harbour Bar and had a quiz at the Youth Hostel after the evening meal organised by James Hassall and Franky Rebelo: super quiz masters!

Day 2 started with free time in Scarborough followed by a trip to the Sea Life Centre, Scarborough Castle, the Rotunda Museum and (more) ice cream at Scarborough South Bay.

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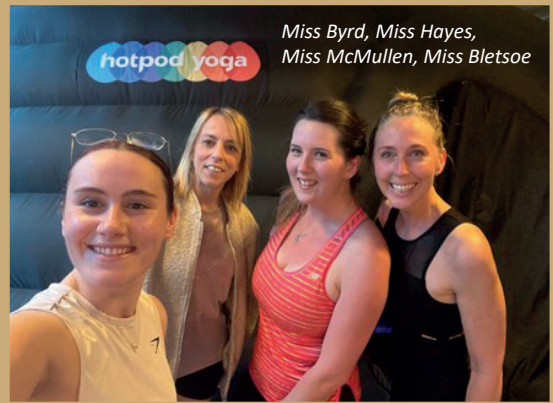

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SCHOLARS TRIP TO



School has had some lovely feedback from the staff who were leading the workshops for our Year 7 and 8 trip to Chester Zoo on Wednesday 24th April. They said that both groups were polite, engaged, enthusiastic and had great subject knowledge! They did themselves proud all day.

We had lots of time to explore the zoo and see animals such as elephants, snow leopards and lions, writes Year 8 Bella Beardmore. Year 8 were given the opportunity to take part in a workshop about ecosystems in which we learnt the necessary conditions and elements needed for an ecosystem to function. The workshop also included a task in which we had to identify and observe different birds in the tropical area of the Zoo. The final

part of the workshop was getting to enter the lemur enclosure where we were taught about different varieties of lemurs and their only predator: the fossa. Overall, we had an exciting, enjoyable and educational day and would love to go again!

When we arrived, the staff members were so welcoming and friendly and loved a good chat too!, writes Year 7 Lauren Caton. To begin the workshop, we learnt what an ecosystem actually was. I learnt that an ecosystem is a geographical area where plants, animals and organisms form to build life.

After a brief introduction to the topic, we moved over to the Madagascar area.

Travelling into the lemur section, we learnt all about a special type of tree that can hold water in the dry seasons so it's perfect for the



animals in the wild so they can use the tree as its water supply.

It was interesting to learn not only about the animals native to that habitat, but also the adaptations and convenient aspects of the nature, as well.

The first species of lemur we ran into were the ring-tailed lemurs. We learnt that their iconic black and white tails are actually a mechanism of balance that supports their incredible climbing abilities and are in fact, longer than the entire length of their bodies!

Another unique feature of these animals is that the majority of lemurs are nocturnal, however, ring-tailed ones are active during the day.

Moving outside of the lemur exhibit, we were met with a glass screen that enclosed a couple of fossas; the most powerful predators in Madagascar. However, when up close fossa are extremely small. They were about the size of my cat! It was amazing to think that the most powerful and feared animals in Madagascar were the size of a household pet!

Moving away from the Madagascan exhibit, we walked over to the tropical realm. In groups of four, we monitored different species of bird and did some of the typical jobs of the zookeepers, like where female and male birds of a certain species were and what they did. We also looked at what they ate and who and what they interacted with.

So, overall, our experience of Chester Zoo with a school group was informative, interesting and inspiring! I would more than definitely recommend it to others!

The trip was a great success and a fantastic experience – especially for those students who may be interested in studying food technology at GCSE level in a few years' time.

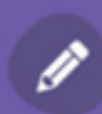
