


Transport

We are fortunate enough to benefit from excellent public transport links and operate several school bus routes from in and around the borough. The majority of students at Lymm use a Touch and Go bus pass, this can be purchased directly from Warrington's Own Buses website. Students can also pay for their bus fare using cash on the day.

The First Few Days

Over the first few days at Lymm High School your child will take part in a series of introductory activities. They will meet and spend time with their new Form Tutor and Form Group. Your child will also see their Head of Year and their Year 7 Pastoral Support Manager so they know who to go to with any problems. All students will attend a year group assembly, bringing them into daily life at Lymm High and offering the opportunity to meet students in other years of the school. Students will also get straight into lessons (although for the first fortnight will not be set any homework) to meet classmates and get to know their new timetable. Importantly, they'll get the chance to sign up for extra-curricular activities, and if ready, jump straight into all that is on offer.

Forms and Year Groups

Lymm High School is divided into five year groups, with two Sixth Form year groups. In each year group there are 10 Form groups. Each Form has a Form Tutor, who along with a Head of Year and Pastoral Support Manager, are responsible for the pastoral and academic care of your child. If you or your child have any worries or concerns, the first person to contact would be your child's Form Tutor.

The Hall System

Now your child is part of Lymm High School they will become a member of one of five 'Halls', which are named after well-known Cheshire Halls: Arley, Dunham, Moreton, Tatton and Walton. They will attend monthly Hall assemblies, comprising all Hall members from Years 7–13 and be given the opportunity, to represent their Hall at Inter-Hall competitions at various times of the year. There are lots of opportunities for student leadership in the Halls; from Hall Captain in the Sixth Form to Form Captain and members of charity committees.



ARLEY HEAD OF HALL I Miss N Beck

Named after the Cheshire Grade II listed building, Arley Hall is situated 4 miles south of Lymm. It is home to the owner, Viscount Ashcroft, and his family. The house is a Grade II listed building, as is its adjacent chapel. Arley Hall's mascot is Aragon the Dragon and students can be identified by the bright red stripe in their tie. The Hall is a supporter of the Meningitis Trust Charity.





DUNHAM HEAD OF HALL I Mr W Barnett

Dunham Hall sits within Dunham Massey Park. It is a Georgian Mansion built in 1616. The Hall has been owned by the National Trust since 1976 which looks after the 45 listed buildings on the land. All of Dunham's work is supported by their mascot, 'Dirk' the Dunham Deer and students can be identified by the light blue stripe in their tie. The Hall actively raises money for the Help For Heroes Charity.





MORETON HEAD OF HALL I Miss S Rowley

Little Moreton Hall is situated near Congleton. It was built in the Tudor period for William Moreton and his family. The earliest part of the house was built around 1504, with the rest finished by 1610. It now belongs to the National Trust and is a Grade 1 listed building. The Hall's mascot is Moreton Bear and their chosen charity is The Christie. Moreton students can be identified by the green stripe in their tie.





TATTON HEAD OF HALL I Mrs J Wagstaff

Tatton Hall is a Georgian mansion and Grade 1 listed building built in 1807—1816 for Samuel Egerton. During World War II, Tatton Park served as a training ground for the Allied RAF Parachute regiment and now belongs to the National Trust.

The Tatton Tiger is the Hall's faithful companion and mascot, and students can be identified by the burgundy stripe in their tie. Tatton Hall supports the local children's respite centre, Claire House.





WALTON HEAD OF HALL I Miss T Taylor

Walton Hall was built between 1836 and 1838 for Sir Gilbert Greenall, MP. The Hall is owned by the Greenall family and is a Grade II listed building on the National Heritage list for England. Walton Hall have been enthusiastic supporters of the local charity, St Roccos, and Wolfie is the loyal Walton mascot. Walton students can be identified by the navy blue stripe in their tie.





Communication

We are very proud of all the achievements of our students and we are also keen to ensure that parents are well informed about the very many events and activities happening at Lymm. We use a variety of channels to communicate with parents.

The School Website

This is our main means of communication with parents. Our individual year group parent communication pages include details of forthcoming events, links to key information and letters. School policies can also be found here.

Class Charts

Lymm High School recognises the importance of communication between home and school. The strong relationships we have established with our parents and carers ensures the best outcomes are achieved by our students. To further enhance these communication efforts, we use a software package called Class Charts. This allows parents/carers to log-in and view information about their child(ren) at Lymm High School, such as their attendance, timetables, behaviour and achievements. Student absence can also be reported via Class Charts. Log-in details will be included with your joining information.

Monthly Newsletter

Every month or two (depending on holidays), the school publishes a newsletter full of useful information and news stories celebrating our students' achievements. The Lymm High School Newsletter is published on the school website, social media pages and a notification is sent to parents via Class Charts.

Parent Bulletin

Every 2 weeks the school publishes a parent bulletin. This document is sent to parents directly via Class Charts and includes a summary of all notices, event reminders and letters published on the school website over the previous 2-week period. We would encourage parents to read this for details on upcoming events and important notices.

Sports Fixtures & Results

We use SOCS, an online school communication system for extra-curricular sport sessions, sport fixtures and results. If you want to see the full Sports Programme visit https://sport.lymmhigh.org.uk You can also access the LHS Sports Portal via the school website.

Social Media

Lymm has an active Facebook page (facebook.com/LymmHighSchool), 'X' account (@LymmHighSchool) and Instagram site, which all parents are warmly encouraged to follow. These are updated on a daily basis with current stories, events, pictures and videos from Lymm High School.

Emergency Contact

There may be occasions when we need to contact you urgently. For safeguarding purposes, it is very important that parents/carers provide the school with emergency contact numbers on which we can call you at any time of the school day. It would be helpful if you could also provide a second contact number. Increasingly, we are using email as a form of communication with parents. Please could you also provide the school with an email address. Please notify us immediately of any changes of contact details.

Attendance

We are very proud of our students' excellent attendance and punctuality to school. We have high standards and expectations from students because we believe that outstanding attendance and punctuality enables your child to maximise their learning opportunities.

What is Good Attendance?

We expect all students to attend school on a regular basis. It is the responsibility of parents to ensure their child's regular attendance to school (Section 444, Education Act 1994). Above 97% attendance is seen as a good level of attendance and the Department for Education sets a minimum expectation of 94% attendance for all students. If your child's attendance falls below 92% we can offer support and intervention from our Attendance Officer and the pastoral team.

Student Absence

We ask that parents inform us of absence using Class Charts. We will contact you on the morning of the first day of absence if we do not have a reason so that we can authorise the absence.

Unfortunately, we cannot authorise holidays during term time. For any other absence requests (e.g., medical appointments), please inform us via the Class Charts 'Report new absence' button.

Leaving School During the School Day

If students must leave school during the day, please notify us beforehand. Students are not allowed to leave the premises unless met in Main Reception by their parent or carer in order that school can transfer the child back into the care of a responsible adult. Parents must use the electronic screen to sign their child out upon collection.

Punctuality

We maintain very high standards of punctuality and expect every student to arrive at school by 8.20am for an 8.25am start in registration or assembly.



Pastoral Care & Safeguarding

Pastoral care for all of our students is of the upmost importance to us. Your child's Form Tutor, Head of Year, Pastoral Support Manager and the Student Services team will ensure that any of your child's pastoral needs are cared for.

Pastoral care is part of every school day. Your child will spend 20 minutes before lessons each morning in their Form group. This gives them the opportunity to prepare for the day ahead and to spend time with their Form Tutor. Form Tutors build strong relationships with their Forms and often stay with their students throughout their time at school.

Over the course of the school week, during morning registration students will:

- Meet with their Form Tutor and morning registration will be taken
- Have daily checks (e.g., uniform, equipment and Knowledge Organiser booklets)
- Work on the Pastoral Curriculum through reading, discussion and collaboration
- Attend assembly with their Form Tutor once a week

Student Services

Student Services play a key role in safeguarding and protecting the welfare of students at Lymm High School. Centrally located and available throughout the school day, Student Services can help with any day-to-day issues – feeling unwell, forgotten PE kits or lunches, asking for support, needing to call home. Mrs Ball leads a team of Pastoral Managers for Years 7–11 all of whom are trained to an advanced level in safeguarding. Miss Carrington is the Pastoral Manager for Year 7. We also have a first aider based in Student Services. The Student Services team enjoy excellent relationships with pupils, parents, staff and external support agencies. We encourage parents and carers to contact the team with any issues, no matter how small. We are always happy to help in any way we can.

Pupil Premium

Pupil Premium is funding from Government that schools receive to raise the academic attainment of certain groups of students.


These are students who:

- Currently receive Free School Meals (FSM)
- Have previously received FSM in the last six years
- Are currently in Local Authority care ('Looked After Child')
- Are an adopted child (previously in Local Authority care, even if for one day)
- Are under a 'Special Guardianship Order' or 'Child Arrangements Order' (having left Local Authority care)
- Have a parent currently serving in the UK Armed Forces or whose parent is in receipt of an Armed Forces pension (or have in the last 6 years)

If your child falls into any of these categories, please tell us.

If you think your child is eligible for Pupil Premium, please get in touch with your child's Head of Year as soon as possible.

Any school funding is invaluable and this will be used to directly support your child in a number of ways. We will treat information in absolute confidence.



Learning Support at Lymm High School (SEND)

At Lymm High School we recognise our responsibility for ensuring all students with special needs (including all forms of disability) achieve their full potential.

We have a very inclusive ethos that allows all pupils to participate in the full curriculum. We seek to develop effective ways of overcoming barriers to learning and sustaining effective teaching through the analysis and assessment of children's needs. We monitor the quality of teaching and standards of students' achievements and set appropriate targets for improvement. The specialist team of professionals within the faculty of Learning Development has day-to-day responsibility for the operation of the Special Educational Needs (SEN) policy which is led by Miss Yates. They coordinate the provision made for individual students with SEN or disabilities by working closely with staff, parents, carers and other agencies. Our SEN offer is available on the school website.

The Curriculum

We are proud to provide a rich and varied curriculum for all students at Lymm High School. Our curriculum is exciting and provides challenge and support for students of all ages and abilities. More information about our curriculum can be found on the school website.

The Timetable

All students in the school follow a two-week timetable: in essence this means they will have different lessons from week A to week B. Each lesson lasts for 60 minutes. It is always useful if a copy of the timetable is kept in a suitable place at home to help with organisation and preparation. It would be really helpful if you could check that your child has the correct books and equipment.

KS3

Students follow a broad and balanced curriculum in Key Stage 3:

- All students study English, Mathematics and Science
- Students study French in Year 7
- All students study technology subjects (Design Technology and Food Technology) on a rotational basis so they can experience each subject within the faculty during the year
- In Year 7 students study PE four times a fortnight
- Students also receive lessons in Performing Arts (Music, Drama, Dance), ICT, Art and Humanities (Geography, History, Religion, Philosophy and Ethics)

Reporting Progress

We assess students' progress on a regular basis, and set aspirational targets for achievement for the end of each year and Key Stage. Throughout the year we will report home on your child's progress in the subjects they are studying. Both effort and attainment are assessed so that you can see a full picture of your child's progress during the year.

Homework

Homework is an important part of school life at Lymm High School. At the start of the year, students are issued with log-in details for Satchel One, a homework recording system which has improved communication and organisation within school. This should help your child and you to keep a check on homework. Homework clubs are run every day and are supervised by our Teaching Assistants:

Parents' Evening

In addition to the reports you will receive regarding your child's progress, we also hold parents' evenings once a year when you will have an opportunity to discuss your child's progress in more depth with subject teachers. Online parents' evenings have proved very popular this year and based on positive parental feedback, this will be the format moving forwards.

Gifted & Talented

At Lymm High School we work hard to meet the needs of students of all abilities. One aspect of this is the work undertaken to stretch and challenge the most able students in our care. We use KS2 SAT results alongside assessments in January of Year 7 to nominate students for our Scholars Programme. We may also refer to CAT scores as well as end-of-year assessments. The programme is coordinated by Ms Dockerill, and more information is available on the school website.

The Life Programme

The Life Programme gives students the knowledge, skills and understanding to play an effective role in society at local, national and international levels. The topics covered help them to become informed, thoughtful and responsible citizens who are aware of their duties and rights. It promotes their spiritual, moral, social and cultural development, making them more self-confident and responsible both in and beyond the classroom. The Life Programme is delivered using a whole-school approach, which includes a combination of discrete lessons with separate curriculum time delivered by teachers. We also use assemblies, form time and drop-down days to reinforce learning. Personal, Social, Health and Economic education (PSHE) is an integral part of the curriculum and is included in programmes of study at every level in each subject.

Leadership Ladder

The Leadership Ladder reflects the aims of Lymm High School for all students: exercising social responsibility, developing leadership skills and providing cultural experiences to help broaden their horizons.

Detailed List of Requirements

We take great pride in our uniform and appearance and expect all students to wear their full uniform correctly at all times.

Lymm High School requires all items to be labelled and that the length of skirts rest no more than 2 inches above the knee when standing straight. Please see p.28 for a list of items that are not permitted.

In winter, students are allowed to wear layers underneath their PE kit (with the exception of hoodies and coats).

Students can also wear hats and gloves. If students are wearing Lymm training tops, the layers do not have to be Lymm uniform. If they are wearing the Lymm PE shirt, we ask for layers to be white or blue to match the PE kit colours. Tracksuit bottoms are always permitted as long as they are official Lymm PE ones.

Please note: School kit must be worn for extra-curricular clubs and fixtures



Swimming

If your child needs to wear goggles, please provide a letter stating that you, as parent/carer, take full responsibility for their safety concerning the wearing of goggles during lessons. Any student who needs to be excused from swimming must always bring normal PE kit.

Please note: It is expected that all students will be involved in PE and staff can make necessary reasonable adjustments. However, on the rare occasion your child may need to be excused from PE, please provide a letter which states the reason why they are not taking part in the activity. It must also include a contact telephone number, the date and a parent/carer's signature. Letters will be monitored.

Excused students must still wear Lymm High School PE kit and will undertake other roles where possible (e.g., leader or official).

Water Bottles

Please ensure that your child takes responsibility for bringing their own water bottle. We strongly recommend that, along with all PE kit, these are clearly labelled with their name.

Standards & Expectations

Uniform

Please note the following items are **not permitted** as part of normal uniform:

- Any fashion trousers including drainpipes/ leggings/ canvas/ chino/ jean-style or denim
- Fashion shirts or t-shirts showing above the collar or visible through shirt
- Cardigans
- Patterned tights, footless tights, ankle socks worn over tights
- Hooded tops or sweatshirts
- Sports or denim jackets
- Trainers or shoes with sports logos, canvas shoes, pumps or boots of any kind (please see website for further guidance)
- Fashion belts & buckles (plain black only)
- Gloves, scarves or hats worn inside the building
- Coloured hair accessories (plain and dark only are permitted)

Jewellery

Students may wear a wrist watch (not smart watch) whilst in school. Students will be required to remove any piercings or items of

Hair

Students are required to wear plain, and dark coloured hair accessories only. Unnatural hair colour, extreme hairstyles and cuts of less than a number two are not allowed. Please bear this in mind if they are having their hair

Make-up

Make-up must be discreet: for example, light and natural-looking concealer make-up may be worn. Fake tan is not permitted. Nails must be short with no varnish, gel, extensions or jewels. Eyebrows and eyelashes should look natural, no eyelash extensions.

Essential Equipment

All students should carry their equipment in an appropriate school bag. The minimum expectation is that all students come properly equipped to school with the following:

- Pencil case or tin
- Blue or black pen
- Pencil
- Ruler
- Eraser
- Calculator
- A suitable book of their choice for reading
- Knowledge Organiser Booklet (these are provided)

From time to time subject teachers may advise on additional texts or equipment. Parents will be notified in advance.

^{*}A judgement about what is or is not ultimately acceptable as regards to uniform is left to the discretion of the headteacher (who may delegate the power to a member of the Senior Leadership team). If a student is in incorrect uniform, they will be provided with a replacement item that meets the uniform requirements to wear during that day. Students who refuse to conform to the school's uniform and appearance policy will be sanctioned in accordance with our behaviour policy.



Mobile phones

The only times phones or other electronic devices (including tablets and wireless earphones) are allowed would be when a member of staff has given explicit permission for their use, under supervision and for a specific learning need (e.g. the use of an app for GCSE revision).

At all other times, devices need to be turned off and kept in bags from the moment students arrive on site in the morning until they leave the buildings at the end of the day. There is a complete ban on smart watches. Parents needing to get messages to students are able to do this by contacting Student Services, who will pass messages on. Likewise, students needing to contact home during the day are always able to do so via Student Services. If there is a particular reason why your child needs to have access to their mobile phone during the school day (e.g. an app to track diabetes), please contact school to discuss. Should you need to contact your child in an emergency, please contact Student Services on 01925 750711.

Confiscation of Items

If an item is confiscated e.g. jewellery or a non regulation uniform item, it will be held in Student Services until the end of the week. For students who have items persistently confiscated, they will be held in Student Services until the end of the half term. Please note: Fizzy drinks, Energy Drinks and all cans are not permitted in school and will be confiscated.

Insurance Notice

We will do our best to assist your child in safeguarding their property. However, the school does not take any responsibility for the loss or damage to any personal possessions brought onto site. We recommend that parents/carers make their own arrangements for insurance of bags, clothing, watches, bicycles etc (usually by extension of your home insurance). Large amounts of money or items of value should not be brought into school.

Technology

As part of your child's curriculum and the development of ICT skills, Lymm High School provides supervised access to the internet. We believe that the effective use of the World Wide Web and email is worthwhile and is an essential skill for children as they grow up in the modern world.

Please read the rules for responsible internet use.

Rules for Students & Staff

The computer system is owned by the school. The school Online Safety Policy helps to protect students, staff and the school by clearly stating what use of the computer resources is acceptable and what is not.

Irresponsible use may result in the loss of network access.

Network access must be made via the user's authorised account and password, which must not be given to any other person.

School computer and Internet use must be appropriate to the student's education or to staff professional activity.

Copyright and intellectual property rights must be respected.

Email should be written carefully and politely, particularly as messages may be forwarded or printed and be seen by unexpected readers.

Users are responsible for emails they send and for contacts made. Anonymous messages and chain letters are not permitted.

The use of unauthorised chat rooms is not allowed.

Online Safety

Although there are concerns about students potentially having access to undesirable materials, we have taken positive steps to reduce this risk in school.

Our school operates a filtering system that restricts access to inappropriate materials. Whilst every endeavour is made to ensure that suitable restrictions are placed on the ability of children to access inappropriate materials, the school cannot be held responsible for the nature or content of materials accessed through the Internet.

The school will not be liable for any damages arising from your child's use of the Internet facilities. For further information and guidance on e-safety please consult the Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre (www.ceop.police.uk).

The school may exercise its right to monitor the use of the school's computer systems, including access to websites, the interception of email and the deletion of inappropriate materials where it believes unauthorised use of the school's computer system is or may be taking place; or the system is or may be being used for criminal purposes or for storing unauthorised or unlawful text, imagery or sound.

Choices & Consequences

As part of growing up, there can be times when students make wrong choices about their behaviour. We have a simple and clear sanction system which may apply in such cases, which includes detentions or isolation, among other strategies.

Anti-Bullying

The school operates a 'Zero Tolerance' policy towards bullying of any kind, and as such, we experience very little bullying. We take a very firm stance on the matter. However, on the few occasions when it does happen, bullying will be dealt with promptly and very seriously by senior members of staff.

Careful steps are taken to ensure the matter does not recur.

We encourage students to tell an adult, especially their Form Tutor, if they feel they are the subject of bullying or if they wish to report bullying of others. Parents will be contacted promptly and are kept informed at every step.
