The fascinating back story of Oughtrington Hall is unveiled in a new book released this month.

I nstead of its usual role of providing a haven for learning, Lymm High's Oughtrington Hall has become its own subject of study. Local author Roger Hannam has explored two centuries of history of the

Grade II listed building in his new book entitled *Oughtrington Hall and its People.*¹

From Monday to Friday, most weeks of the year, Oughtrington Hall is Lymm's busiest building as it echoes to the sound of thousands of students as the original core of Lymm High School. But 200 years ago it would have been the much more subdued sound of cooks, maids, grooms, governesses and



butlers as they tended to one of Lymm's great estates.

The Hall was built in the early 1800s and was occupied by the Trafford family, descendants of the Leighs of West Hall, High Legh.

The historian George Ormerod, writing before 1819, stated: *the hall, a handsome and spacious mansion, has been recently nearly rebuilt, and is seated on high ground, commanding an extensive prospect of the vale of the Mersey and the high hills which enclose it.*² In 1862, Oughtrington Hall was bought by George Charnley Dewhurst a cotton manufacturer from Manchester. He made the Hall slightly larger and built St Peters Church across the road. This is where Lymm High School has its annual Christmas Services.

When war broke out in 1914, Henry Ford (founder of the Ford Motor Company) wanted to help the war effort by opening a hospital for wounded soldiers. However,

he was advised that this was not allowed given the USA's neutrality in the war. Therefore, at the suggestion of his wife Clara they came up with a plan to create a settlement for Belgian refugees. Over 250,000 Belgian refugees had fled their country in the face of the German onslaught in the second half of 1914.

Oughtrington Hall had been bought 3 years earlier in 1911 by Sir William Lever, but was now lying empty. Percival Perry, a Lymm resident, who was head of Ford Motor Company (England) Limited and a family friend of Henry Ford, had relayed the plight of the Belgian refugees. He wrote to Clara Ford suggesting that he could negotiate a short-term lease on the building. With their authority, Perry leased Oughtrington Hall to accommodate ninety men, women and children. Sir Farming the fields. William Lever would take rent on the building from Henry Ford but would then re-donate it to the Belgian refugee fund.

Work quickly went ahead preparing Oughtrington Hall to receive the Belgian refugees. This colony was funded entirely by Henry Ford. The Belgian community that lived in the Hall created their own chapel, Laundry, and sewing and repair workshops. They even had

their own farm, including a Piggery and Stables. The ground surrounding the hall was used for part of the farm, which is now the school fields.

In *Oughtrington Hall and its People,* Roger Hannam includes the poignant story of the building's role as another haven for refugees during World War I, as well as an early link to Peterloo, and later as a temporary home for pupils of a revolutionary outdoor school. The book goes on to describe how the building became the fourth home of Lymm Grammar School and its subsequent transition into the high school we know today.

Roger Hannam, told us that he enjoyed researching and writing about Oughtrington Hall, not least because his two daughters were students at the High School and his grandson attends today. "Historic buildings are important but what brings them to life are the stories of the people who use and occupy them", he said.


Segovia: A Roman Aqueduct and a Fairytale Castle






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BLOOD POOL WORKSHOP

On Thursday 17th October, a selection of Year 8, 9, 10 and 11 students took part in a specialist workshop to promote critical thinking.

ear 9 participated in the 'CSI blood pool' Forensic Science workshop from Thinkers in Education.


"At the start of the session, we were told about a body found with blood on its hands and how we had to collect DNA and fingerprints to work out who was guilty of the murder", said Bella Beardmore.

"We solved the crime by analysing autopsy and crime scene photographs, dusting for fingerprints, putting DNA samples into agarose gel to do electrophoresis, and drawing a conclusion based on the results of this evidence", said Ben Shaw.

As the students waited for the results from their DNA samples, they used black magnetic powder and a squirrel-hair brush to create their own fingerprints. "When we received our DNA back it told us that the same person's DNA was found under the victim's nails and on the weapon that they were killed with. The fingerprints we had inspected also matched this theory so we knew we had found the culprit", said Bella.

Throughout the session, each team could gain points by working quickly, efficiently or well as a team. "At the end of the session, we were given handsets to complete a quiz and see how well other teams had done. The leaders of the workshop praised our efforts and told us we had achieved one of the highest scores as a year group out of schools across the country. We had an exciting and enjoyable time and would love to take part in this type of event again", said Bella.

"The workshop was a great challenge and improved skills such as decision making under pressure, picking up a new skill and putting it into practice, and incorporating new knowledge into our decisions", said Ben.

The Visual Arts department run a visiting artist programme to provide students with the opportunity to develop their knowledge of different techniques, materials and processes.

O n Wednesday 25th September, the department was lucky enough to welcome artist Joël Penkman in to run a workshop with Year 10 GCSE Fine Art students. Penkman specialises in painting semiphotorealistic, contemporary still-life with a particular focus on food. "Year 10 students are currently working on their coursework projects with the theme 'Food' and so the opportunity to work closely with an artist who specialises in food paintings was so valuable", said Miss Simms.

Students learnt all about the techniques and processes Penkman uses in her work, as well as how she came to be working as a full-time artist. In the morning session, focus was on photography of a variety of sweets and cakes, and students learnt how important composition and good quality photography is before starting to draw and paint. From these photographs, the group went on to draw their chosen composition and apply paint guided by Penkman herself.

The group were introduced to a traditional painting technique called egg tempera. For centuries, egg tempera was artists' preferred medium for panel paintings, including many medieval and Renaissance masterpieces found in museums and art galleries. This type of paint is created by mixing egg yolk with powdered pigments and a little water.

All students involved started some fantastic paintings which they will continue to work on for their current coursework projects.

3D CITY DESIGN TOUR

On Monday 7th October, Year 12 3D Design students spent the day exploring the architectural sights of Manchester city centre.

he objectives for the trip were to learn more about the architectural history of Manchester, and to take photographs and complete observational drawings of architecture seen during the tour; paying close attention to architecture that related to the students' current coursework projects.

The group visited a wide range of architectural points of interest across the city including KAMPUS, Mayfield Park, New Islington, Piccadilly Gardens, Manchester Cathedral, Spinningfields, Castlefield Viaduct and Bridgewater Hall.

"The trip was a great success", said Miss Simms. "All students really challenged themselves to draw with a range of different materials whilst out and about in the busy city centre." The Design and Technology department look forward to seeing how the photographs and observational drawings develop into the students' coursework projects back at school.
















