LYMM REMEMBERS

Each year, Lymm High comes together to observe Remembrance Day, a solemn occasion dedicated to those who lost their lives in conflict.

t is a tradition that we hold close to our hearts, as it serves not only as a time for reflection, but also as an opportunity to foster a sense of community and a chance

to remember the sacrifices made by others. This year, our commitment to Remembrance Day was as strong as ever, with students, staff, and the wider school community coming together in powerful and meaningful ways.

The Visual Arts and Technology faculty worked tirelessly to create a stunning



installation in honour of Remembrance Day. The display, which extends from A Block through to the Atrium, is a remarkable sight, with hundreds of handmade tissue paper poppies filling the space with their vibrant red petals. Suspended above the Atrium is a netlike structure, carefully crafted from red paper strips on which students across all year groups have written their own personal Remembrance Day messages. These red strips, gathered together, form a protective, net-like canopy — a symbol of the camouflage nets used by the Armed Forces for protection and security during times of war.

Together, the full installation stands as a poignant tribute to the sacrifices made by so many, and a reminder of the importance of remembering our history.

Wreath design

This year also saw the introduction of a Key Stage 3 Inter-Hall wreath design competition, which was a fantastic way for students to



engage with the remembrance process. Neville Davies, our wonderful contact at the Royal British Legion, once again supported us by organising the wreaths and suggested the idea of involving our students in the design of the centrepiece.

The aim of this competition was to design a logo that represented our school, which could be displayed in the centre of the wreath. The response was overwhelming, with so many wonderful designs submitted that it was difficult to choose the winners. However, after much deliberation, the talented Year 7 students Ginny Wong, Chloe Williams and Sophie Williams were selected and each won a lovely set of watercolour brush pens. Their designs were brought to life by our brilliant Design Technology department and were then proudly presented by our winners at the Remembrance Day ceremonies on Monday 11th November at The Cross, our old school site on Limefield Avenue, and at St. Peter's Church.

Community connections

In the run-up to Remembrance Day, our Humanities department worked with Lymm Heritage Centre to create a display alongside the poppy installation. This display highlighted our school's connections with the war, bringing to life the stories of those from our community who served and sacrificed (see Box overleaf). The students and staff who contributed to this project did so with a real sense of purpose, and the resulting exhibition was a poignant reminder of the legacy of war and the importance of remembering those who gave their lives.

To ensure that all students understood the significance of the day, Mrs McGahey created a video assembly that was shared with the whole school. The video provided historical context, shared personal stories, and reinforced the importance of remembrance. It was a moving and thought-provoking piece that left a lasting impression on everyone who watched it. At 11 o'clock on Remembrance Day, our students and staff observed the 2-minute silence with great respect. Mr Starkey and the music team played the *Last Post* in front of school, on the Languages yard and on the English yard.



The sound reverberated through the school, filling the atmosphere with solemnity and reverence. The silence that followed was impeccably observed by all students, each one taking a moment to reflect on the sacrifices made by so many.

Our school's Remembrance Day commemorations are an annual tradition that remind us all of the importance of remembering the past and honouring those who came before us. This year's efforts were a beautiful and emotional display of the commitment we have as a school to uphold this tradition, ensuring that the legacy of the fallen lives on in the hearts and minds of our students. It is through these shared moments of remembrance that we continue to foster a sense of community, respect, and gratitude that will carry us forward for years to come.

Every year, to mark Remembrance Day, Lymm High School will collaborate with Lymm Heritage Centre to tell the story of a local soldier from Lymm who lost his life in one of the World Wars. This year we remember

Pte Edward Johnson, 1897–1917.

Edward (Eddie) was born in the Rushgreen area of Lymm in 1897. His early childhood was hit by a double tragedy. His father, who was a canal boatman drowned in Manchester in 1899 and just 3 years later, his mother also drowned in the Bridgewater Canal in Lymm in unexplained circumstances.

Eddie was brought up by his uncle, George Hazlehurst and his family, who ran a small shop near Lymm Bridge. He attended Pepper Street School and later was a pupil at Lymm School. He was also a chorister at St Mary's Church. He had a brief working life at the Linotype Works in



Altrincham before enlisting in 1915 on or around his 18th birthday. Eighteen was the official minimum age to sign up.

Edward was posted with his regiment to France and on 31st July 1917, he was part of the very first advance in what would become known as the Battle for Passchendaele. The aim was to take possession of a small village on slightly elevated ground that made its position of strategic importance. This disastrous conflict would drag on for months and claim 300,000 British casualties, killed or wounded, but Edward's battle lasted only a few hours. He was reported missing following the very first advance.

After 6 weeks of anguish and uncertainty, it was reported that Eddie died on 2nd August 1917, aged just 20, probably in captivity after being wounded. He is buried at Harlebeke New British Cemetery, West Vlaanderen, Belgium. There is also a half-size memorial to Eddie in the cemetery at St Mary's Church.

GOLDEN SCOUT

his is the highest award a Scout can earn. To complete it, scouts need to have finished all nine of the Challenge Awards, plus six Activity or Staged Activity badges.

Elliot has worked really hard to gain this award over the past 3 years. In the last 2 months alone, he has taken part in both the Cheshire Hike (40km over a weekend) and the Blakfoot Hike (30km), which allowed him to secure the final few badge ticks he needed to gain the gold award.

The Year 9 student attended the Parr Hall in Warrington to collect his award from His Majesty's Lord lieutenant of Cheshire.

Needless to say, Elliot is now very excited to be taking part in his Duke of Edinburgh Bronze award so he can get his hiking boots on again!





SIXTH FORM CERN TRIP

n Friday 22nd November, 30 Maths and Physics students flew to Geneva to fully immerse themselves in the world of Particle Physics.

The Sixth Form students visited CERN where they learnt about Dark Matter as well as learning more about the endless benefits and possibilities regarding Nuclear Fusion.

Founded in 1954, the CERN laboratory is now 75 years old. It was one of Europe's first joint ventures and has 23 member states.

The laboratory sits astride the Franco-Swiss border. Its instruments are purposebuilt particle accelerators and detectors.

Accelerators boost beams of particles to high energies before the beams are made to collide with each other or with stationary targets. Detectors observe and record the results of these collisions.

Students also visited a chocolate factory and got to sample the amazing food and festivities at the Swiss Christmas Markets.

- Have structure to your days.
 It is great to have chilled days but also ensure you are getting some fresh air, are active and continuing to get up and follow your usual routine.
- Spend time with people you love and who make you happy.

Be gentle with yourself. Try not to put too much pressure on yourself and take it one day at a time!

These activities are all positive ways to support your mental health. However, it is also important to recognise when you may need some help and support (see box).
