

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YEAR 9 AT WORK

To support Lymm High's Careers Education, Year 9 had the opportunity to experience the world of work on Wednesday 4th December.

The aim of Lymm High's 'Take your child to work day' was to provide students with the opportunity to engage with employers in a meaningful way and experience the world of work first hand. Students either went to work with family or friends, or remained in school and benefitted from workshops and talks from a range of employers, including:

- Altum delivered a 'Dragon's Den' style class focusing on one of five business sectors (gaming design, fashion brand, content creation, car company or pop-up café).
- **Department for Education** ran two

- different policy-oriented workshops (the basics of government action and how it affects their lives, followed by a debate on the banning of disposable vapes).
- Flight Planning set a group task to plan a flight scenario, highlighting the wide range of jobs available in aviation beyond the standard pilot and engineers.
- Cavendish Nuclear delivered a workshop to develop a comprehensive business case for a new nuclear power station.

Students who went out on placement were

Edward Nicholls and Thomas Beck had a day of work experience at the **Department for Education**. The boys spent the day with senior policy officials within the Breakfast Clubs team, looking at how it intends to roll out the new Government's ambitious manifesto commitment to have a Breakfast Club in all 17,000 primary schools in England.



The boys were set the task of researching the reaction to this policy announcement on social media, and produced a presentation which they delivered to eight senior policy officials.

"I've had great feedback from my colleagues about how well they did and how quick they were to pick this up and present it to the team", said mum Kay Nicholls. "The boys really were a credit to Lymm and I was really proud of them!"

asked to complete a booklet containing a number of activities. These included finding out what the business does, how many people the company employs, what happens if someone has an accident at work, what the perks are for working for that company, and the skills and qualifications needed. Students were also given the opportunity to 'quiz the boss'.

All of these activities helped to make the day as meaningful as possible and gave Year 9 students a worthwhile insight into the world of work. Whether the students went to an external workplace or stayed in school, they all:

- gained an insight into the skills required for a particular job
- increased their awareness of their own skills and strengths
- increased their motivation to do well in school
- gained useful experience for their CV
- appreciated the skills needed to succeed in a job.

Below is a selection of what some of our Year 9 students got up to on their external placements.




Sam Hamilton accompanied mum, Heather, to **Thelwall Infant School**.

Ensuring sport is accessible and inclusive for everyone is so important. I hope this documentary makes people realise that."


The exhibition was a resounding success, with a great turnout from both students and staff. Visitors were impressed by the quality of the work on display.


Some students also displayed the trophies they had won for their work, awarded by the Design & Technology department staff. Bronwen's layered
