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FASCINATING FLORENCE

Sixth Form students enjoyed culture, art and architecture in the Tuscan capital on 13–16th February, writes Year 12 Freya Richards.

ay 1: Amazing architecture

After an early morning start at Manchester Airport, the trip was in full swing. Arriving in Florence the first stop was to explore the city. At Piazza del Duomo, students ventured into shops to experience the local cuisine and take in the surroundings of the incredible architecture around them.

The evening was spent going round the Santa Maria Novella, which is one of the oldest pharmacies in the world, dating from 1221! We then spent some time exploring the market square where local craftsmen were displaying their products.

Day 2: Appreciating the art

Waking up to rain wasn't the ideal start to one of the most adventurous days of the trip. After a short walk across the city, we arrived at the Uffizi Gallery where we had the

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opportunity to spend a couple of
hours going through, and exploring,
the gallery with its vast array of
works from a range of different
artists. Some of the most famous
pieces in the gallery included '*The Birth of Venus*' by Sandro Botticelli
and the '*Madonna del Cardellino*' by
Raphael, as well as pieces done by
artists such as Hans Holbein,
Michelangelo and Da Vinci.

Lunch was spent exploring the Mercato Centrale market where we were able to further explore the local food and other Italian delicacies. In the afternoon, we visited the Galleria dell'Accademia di Firenze where we were able to see Michelangelo's '*David*' as well as the '*Tree of Life*' by Pacino Di Bonaguida.


We then walked back into the centre of Florence where we spent a few hours in the Piazza del Duomo taking in the history of the city and dining at a local restaurant. We then headed up to the Piazzale Michelangelo to look out over the city lit up at night before heading back to the hotel.

Day 3: Walking in the sunshine

Waking up to sunshine and slightly warmer weather was a plus to a sensational day. The morning started with a short walk across the city to the Salvatore Ferraganno store: the leading shoe designer of his time. We then explored the Mercato di Sant'Ambrogio,







sampling the local foods and fresh produce. Next, we made our way over to the Boboli Gardens. We enjoyed walking round the gardens in the sunshine, looking at the views across the city and exploring the different styles of architecture.

To finish the day, we spent the evening on the Ponte Vecchio and the surrounding areas whilst the sun set across the city. We then ended with a trip to the Hard Rock Cafe for dinner before heading back to the hotel for the evening.

Day 4: A fond farewell

To wrap up a sensational trip, the final morning was spent visiting the Gucci Museum, which showcased a range of different statement pieces from different decades. For example, the equestrianism movement, tennis collections and the silk scarves, as well as a floor-toceiling room of the different styles of bags, which had been out on sale over the years.

To end the trip in Florence we spent some time exploring the city taking any last-minute pictures and food before heading back to the airport to land in a very cold Manchester.

What an amazing way to finish the half term. It was a trip to remember!

LOVING LANGUAGES

Z ara, who has just spent the last 6 months in Mexico working as an intern in a marketing company shared her experiences of how studying languages has benefited both her academic and professional journey and initiated so many exciting opportunities.

The visit was organised by the Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) department and included sessions with students from various year groups. Zara engaged with students through interactive discussions, personal anecdotes and demonstrations of language use in real-life scenarios. During the sessions, Zara highlighted several key benefits of language learning:

• Enhanced Career Opportunities: Zara explained how proficiency in foreign languages had opened doors to international job prospects and increased employability in a competitive job market.

• Cultural Awareness and Travel: The pupils learned how languages facilitate deeper connections with different cultures, making travel experiences more enriching and meaningful.

• Cognitive and Academic Benefits: Zara discussed research showing that language learning improves memory, problem-solving skills, and overall academic performance. Increased Confidence and Communication Skills: The ability to communicate in multiple languages boosts self-confidence and strengthens interpersonal skills.

Students found the talks highly motivating and asked insightful questions. Many expressed newfound enthusiasms for studying languages and were particularly inspired by Zara's journey.

Zara is now off to Lisbon for the next 6 months of her year abroad from her studies at Newcastle University. Zara studied both Spanish and French to A' level and has since picked up Portuguese to add to her ever-growing catalogue of languages.

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
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FASHION

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CONTINUING OUR COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY

We are continuing our proud journey as an Eco-School, having successfully retained our national environmental accreditation since our first application in 2023.



The Eco-Schools programme is a prestigious environmental recognition that celebrates schools committed to sustainable practices and environmental stewardship.

In October, our Eco-School team, led by Year 13 Martha Parkinson (Senior Eco-Rep), took an important step in advancing our sustainability





goals with our annual environmental review. During this review, we were joined by Mr Hendrie, our Site Manager, and Mr Marsden, our Finance Director, who helped guide the discussions around our progress and areas for improvement.

Following the review, our Eco-Reps were split into two teams to focus on different environmental challenges. The first team, led by Dr McCombs, is dedicated to promoting **Biodiversity and School Grounds**, ensuring that our outdoor spaces remain healthy, vibrant, and home to a variety of plant and animal species. This team is focused on creating green spaces that foster biodiversity, which also serves as an educational tool for students to learn about ecosystems and conservation.

"The Biodiversity Team have got started, now that the weather is more amenable to working outdoors", said Dr McCombs. "We agreed that our Bug Hotel, which is now nearly 4 years old, needs some TLC, and so that should be our top priority."

"We also investigated the school allotment, which has recently been cleared and could be a really exciting thing for us to get stuck in to."

Meanwhile, the second Eco-Rep team, led by Miss Cucuz, is addressing the critical issue of **litter**. Their goal is to reduce waste around the school, increase recycling efforts, and encourage everyone to take responsibility for keeping our environment clean. This group is embracing the national 'Great Big School Clean Up' initiative and has been working on raising awareness about the importance of waste management and organising campaigns to ensure that our school grounds are free of litter.

We are incredibly proud of the dedication and enthusiasm shown by our students, staff and community in working towards a greener, cleaner and more sustainable future. As an Eco-School, we believe that every small action counts, and together, we can continue making a positive impact on our environment.

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STRONG LEADER HELPS EVERTON REACH QUARTER FINALS


Gabriel Gyepi-Garbrah has just returned from a tour to Barcelona with Everton FC.


Progressing into the Round of 16, they played Oxford United and won the game 5–4.
